

Everyone is different – find what works for you.

But make sure you include some variety.



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How to Revise

The least effective form of revision....
.... Just reading some notes.

You can fool yourself into thinking you know it

“Yeah, I know it”
Great.... But can you show that you know it?



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How to Revise



The least effective form of revision....
.... Just reading some notes.

Be active and engage your brain.

It is the act of trying to answer a question, and trying to **use** the knowledge that tells your brain it's an important thing to remember

Read it... but then try to recall it

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How to revise for GCSE English Language exams



- For Paper 1:
 - read the first page of a novel or short story
 - Select a passage and focus on **language**: what techniques has the writer used to make it interesting, memorable, moving, entertaining, or otherwise effective?
 - Look at how the writer uses **structure**: how does the piece introduce, develop and explore an idea, emotion, character or place?
 - Make up an **evaluative** statement about the extract. Imagine a student or teacher is presenting their opinion of the piece, For example, ‘A student said that this story creates an emotional rollercoaster for the reader.’ Now decide whether you **strongly agree / agree / are undecided / disagree / strongly disagree**, and explain why in detail.
 - Choose an **image** as the starting point for a piece of **descriptive** writing.
 - Write a **story** about a general topic such as a moment of extreme weather, a journey, a meeting between two people, or a celebration. Use the same writing skills as the ones you have been looking for when analysing examples of others’ writing.



How to revise for GCSE English Language exams



- For Paper 2:
 - Read examples of **news articles** and other **non-fiction writing** (e.g. travel or **cookery writing**)
 - Compare two articles on the same topic. For example, news stories from newspapers with very **different audiences**. What are the similarities and differences between the two articles?
 - How do the writers put across **opinions**? What **inferences** can you find in the articles?
 - Practice your **persuasive** and **discursive** writing skills
 - Be sure you know how to set your writing out in different **forms**, such as a...
 - Letter
 - Speech
 - Blog post
 - Magazine article
 - Diary entry



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How to revise for GCSE English Literature exams



- Practice essay questions on *Macbeth*, *Blood Brothers*, *A Christmas Carol*, Power and Conflict poems, and unseen poetry.
- Answer all the questions, not just your favourites :)
- Don't be tempted to answer on questions we have not studied together in class
- Find out about the writers, their lives, and who they were writing for.
- Make your revision work for you. VAK? A mind map, a song/rap, a dance routine? Colour code your notes, make flash cards, use dual coding, work with a study buddy, and above all... don't bottle up the stress :)
- Ask lots of questions and try to put yourself in the examiner's shoes: what do they want? Why are they asking you that question? What skills and knowledge do you want to show off to them?
