- Saying 'It's just banter' or ending your sentence with 'Just kidding' doesn't unsay a hurtful comment.
- Keep your language and behaviour clean.

Students get hands-on experience at Grantham engineering firms

At West Grantham C of E Secondary Academy, Year 10 engineering students are taking part in a course which combines school-based theory work with practical instruction, all leading to industry-recognised qualifications.

Miss Slack is lead teacher of engineering at the academy and says the course is proving a success with students. She said: "I am so pleased with how the students are taking to the new engineering course which is equivalent to taking a GCSE."

Students study theory classes in the academy, coupled with practical sessions at two Grantham engineering firms - Iconic Engineering Solutions and Pentangle Engineering Services Ltd.

Miss Slack added: "This is a unique opportunity that WGSA offers, and it really prepares our students for the world of work. They get insight into the workings of a local business, and we are hopeful that this will lead to some apprenticeship opportunities."

This term, students have already made their own trammel, which is used for scribing arcs when marking out.

Jamie Clare, managing director of Iconic Engineering Solutions, has welcomed the opportunity to work with the students.

He said: "Working with West Grantham Academy has enabled us to fulfil several of our goals as a company this year. We have been able to engage with a school directly and help forge a qualification that is new to them with our direct industry knowledge."

"We have also been able to interact with students at a much earlier time in their school pathway which has helped a few of them decide whether engineering is for them... happily I think most of them are loving it!"

Cayden Swann, a Year 10 student on the course, said: "I am finding the course very fun and exciting. I started initially because my parents recommended it. But now I am considering a career in engineering because I really enjoy the subject and it's great to be able to see all the progress I've made since I started."

"It's fun to know that the parts we're making are being used for something practical and not just for something that is used once or twice."

Year 10 student Josh Riley is taking part in the initiative and said: "The course has inspired me to take a career in engineering. I chose it because I thought it would be interesting; but now I see it as a future career. My favourite part is the hands-on, practical part of the course."

Nigel said the course will future proof Grantham's proud history in engineering and manufacturing industries. "Grantham is known for its engineering history and without the new generations getting involved, it will be history."

"There is no reason why, with some hard work and determination, that the students of today can't be the engineers of tomorrow."

Students at West Grantham C of E Secondary Academy can choose the course as an option in Year 9 to take at Key Stage 4.

West Grantham C of E Secondary Academy hold 'Women in Industry Day' for Year 10 and 11 girls

Women with extraordinary business acumen share their stories with students.

Students at West Grantham C of E Secondary Academy welcomed three guests to speak at their 'Women in Industry' event, aimed at inspiring female students to aim high in their career goals. Clare Barber is Principal at West Grantham C of E Secondary Academy and said she wants students to overcome both real and perceived barriers in their future careers. "We want our KS4 girls to attain the confidence to achieve their rightful place in society and the world of work."

The three visitors were Zoë Blake, CEO of CareLoop Health, Slava Barber Head of Human Resources UK and EU at Soloprotect, and Helen Waite, Deputy Director at the Department for Education.

Additionally, as a Ukrainian national, visitor Slava Barber was also able to spend some time speaking to two of the academy's younger Ukrainian students. All three reported that they thoroughly enjoyed speaking in their mother tongue about their shared culture, and what they miss about home.

Zoë Blake is CEO of CareLoop Health and formerly CEO of Kooth. She attended the event and was able to work with the year 10 and 11 students. She said, "It was an honour to be invited to West Grantham C of E Secondary Academy, and to meet the Year 10 and 11 girls. The school has a lovely welcoming atmosphere." Student Elly-May Cooper said the event was beneficial, "It was really useful, and I enjoyed it a lot. It gave me an understanding that you can do anything you put your mind to."

Another guest speaker was Helen Waite, who is a Deputy Director at the Department for Education. Helen said she enjoyed speaking to the students about her own career and experience within the civil service. "It was fantastic to take part in an event designed to raise the aspiration of girls. The civil service offers jobs at all levels right across the country, including a whole range of apprenticeships." Students reported that they learned that with hard work and focus, no matter your background or starting point, it is possible to achieve your goals. Student, Selina Ambrose-Leigh, said, "It was really well done with a wide range in jobs. It helped to reassure me to aim for high performing jobs. I think the school should definitely do this workshop again."

Summing up what she learned at the workshop, student Georgi-Lea Askew had words of wisdom, "No matter what your background is, you have the power to turn it around at any moment. Your worst enemy is often yourself."

Principal, Clare Barber said she felt the event was a great success. "Listening to students break down the reasons that foster low self-esteem or low aspirations means they now grasp how to overcome those barriers. We will continue to support all of our students to aim high in their life ambitions, and hope that events like this are overturning the myths and historical impediments that have meant that many women do not fulfil their potential."

Last Message from the Anti-Bullying Team

In our school, there are many ways we keep you safe:

We have the Anti-Bullying Ambassadors who are solely focused on keeping the other students feeling safe and happy within our school.

There is a safeguarding team consisting of, Mrs Pendleton, Mr Martini, Ms Barber, Mrs Kuffour, Mrs Glover, Mrs Blakey and Mrs Archdale. Students can go to these staff whenever they do not feel safe or need someone to talk to. However, students can go to any teacher they trust if they want. You can also visit Mrs Milligan at lunch if you need someone to talk to, she is a great listener.

At breaks and lunch times, you can visit the library and play chess with your friends or have somewhere to go to when you need a break from the canteen.

The Prefects are also a team who are focused on bettering the school, and will help you report anything, and will be there for you whenever you need somebody to talk to.

Student support is in the corridor between the canteen and the toilets, they are the go-to teachers if there is something wrong. Whether that's a medical ailment, or an emotional need, they are here for all the students.

There are staff at the gates and on duty in almost all corridors just in case any student needs help. They can keep an eye out for bullying and are there for students if they need someone to talk to.

Finally, the Anti-Bullying-Alliance runs some clubs for students during lunch and after school. On Mondays, after period 6 for year 11s, there is a basketball club. During lunch times on Monday and Wednesday there is a friendship club for KS4 and for KS3 this is on Tuesday and Thursday's. This is in the room at the end of the corridor opposite Miss Slack's room in 3.4. It is a good time to meet up with friends to share interests, play board games and have social interaction.
